Show Description:

Metropolis is a new musical adaptation of Thea Von Harbou's dystopian science-fiction novel from 1925, which inspired the iconic 1927 film by Fritz Lang. The story presents a futuristic city with a false utopia that exists above a bleak hidden reality. Metropolis is considered one of the most influential science-fiction stories of all time.

Produced by Little Eggs Collective in association with Hayes Theatre Co, see the story turned into an unforgettable live theatre experience. The Little Eggs Collective works across artistic mediums such as live music, movement, and spoken word to deliver highly collaborative, accessible, timely, and compelling performances. In 2021 and 2022, their productions were nominated for a total of eleven Sydney Theatre Awards, taking home seven.

Unique to this production is Futura, a life-sized robot puppet that will be brought to life and voiced by three cast members. With a talented and diverse cast of twelve, Metropolis will have you on the edge of your seat, captivated and entertained by this mesmerising musical masterpiece.

Stylistic Notes:

Metropolis is a multi-disciplinary production in which lighting, sound, design and expressive movement closely integrate to form a visceral theatrical experience. The show harnesses choreographed movement and detailed ensemble work to form symbolic images and atmosphere. The dramatic action gradually moves from heightened, melodramatic expression into a more contemporary acting style as the story progresses. The original score is a unique blend of neo-classical and choral music with traditional musical theatre, featuring both operatic sounds and jazzy moments inspired by the flapper era of the 1920s. Like the staging, the music moves from a classical to a more contemporary style, featuring modern integration of electronic and trap music. The production design has been fundamentally inspired by the art deco movement. This deeply layered approach is a rich experience for students to engage with and analyse.
